

ASYLUM SCREENING TOOL

Using this Resource

The screening tool is updated as of June 2025. It is intended to elicit sufficient information for an advocate to make an initial determination as to whether someone may be eligible for asylum and to identify where further information may be required. The advocate will likely need to ask further questions and obtain more information before being able to make a definitive assessment as to whether someone is eligible for asylum, which bars to asylum may have been triggered, and whether they should apply.

Some of these questions use legal terms of art or may be confusing if asked directly to community members. The advocate may need to use different language or phrasing for certain questions, appropriate to the asylum seeker they are screening.

Reminders for the Advocate

- If more than a year has passed since the asylum seeker last entered the U.S. and they have not yet filed their asylum application, screen for possible exemptions or exceptions to the **one-year filing deadline**.
- Not all of the statutory bars to asylum are covered in this screener. If the asylum seeker has
 certain criminal convictions or has engaged in certain conduct, they may be subject to a bar
 to asylum, such as the persecutor of others bar, the serious nonpolitical crime bar, or the
 particularly serious crime bar.
- If the person has entered the United States in the last two years (or if they were found inadmissible within two years of their entry), they may be subject to expanded expedited removal, and could face barriers in accessing asylum procedures.
- If the asylum seeker entered the U.S. on or after May 11, 2023, new rules may apply (the Circumvention of Lawful Pathways, Securing the Border rules (currently struck down), or other policies.
- The Trump administration's **212(f) proclamation** currently blocks access to asylum procedures for many asylum seekers arriving at the US border.
- If an asylum seeker is barred from asylum, they may still be eligible for alternative forms of protection (withholding of removal or protection under the Convention Against Torture).
- This resource provides a general template for asylum screening. Depending on the setting in which it is used, and the clients or community members who are being screened, advocates may want to make their own additions or changes to these questions.

F. Additional questions to screen for recent asylum bars

Note: Ask the following questions if entry was through Southern U.S. border without visa or document sufficient for admission between May 11, 2023, and May 11, 2025, to screen for Circumvention of Lawful Pathways (CLP) rule.

As of the last update to this resource, the Securing the Border rule's bar to asylum has been blocked by a legal challenge, but litigation is ongoing, and its status could change.

If entry was on or after January 20, 2025, the INA § 212(f) presidential proclamation may also apply. Those who entered on or after this date may be blocked from accessing asylum altogether. People who were previously removed under the 212(f) proclamation may have received a removal order or may have been expelled without a removal order.
