To apply for LPR Cancellation, a waiver in deportation proceedings, an LPR must not have an aggravated felony conviction, must have been an LPR for 5 years, and must have lived in the U.S. for at least 7 years since admitted in any status.

An LPR can apply for U.S. citizenship after five years LPR status, or three years of marriage to a USC while an LPR; must establish good moral character and should not be deportable.
